**SUPPLEMENTAL DECLARATION OF TERRY N. BUROKER,
DIRECTORATE OF INTELLIGENCE INFORMATION REVIEW OFFICER,
CENTRAL INTELLIGENCE AGENCY**

I, TERRY N. BUROKER, hereby declare and say:

1. I am the Information Review Officer (IRO) for the Directorate of Intelligence (DI) of the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA). My official responsibilities and authorities as IRO that are relevant to the instant case are described in paragraphs one through three of my Declaration, dated April 1, 2005, which was filed as an exhibit to Defendant CIA's Memorandum and Point of Law in Support of its Motion for Summary Judgment and is incorporated by reference herein.

2. Through the course of my official duties, I have become familiar with the Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) claim brought by Plaintiff Larry Berman (Plaintiff) against


the CIA as set forth in the complaint. I have also become familiar with Plaintiff's Motion For Summary Judgment and the documents filed in support thereof. The statements made herein are based upon my personal knowledge and upon information made available to me in my official capacity.

3. The CIA consistently has strived to protect the Presidential Daily Briefs (PDBs) from public release. The few editions of the PDB in the public domain constitute only a small fraction of a percent of the over 13,500 PDBs that have been produced by the CIA since 1961. In addition, the PDBs plaintiff seeks to have released contain information not included in the few PDBs that have been released.

4. As plaintiff notes, the CIA has released CIBs in redacted form. Although both the CIB and the PDB are intelligence products produced by the Directorate of Intelligence, there are significant differences between the CIB and the PDB. Most importantly, the CIA prepares the PDB exclusively for the President and his top advisors. As such, the PDB reflects the national security and foreign policy priorities of the President. The PDB often contains raw intelligence, direct sources and methods information, and articles that are highly classified or compartmented. By contrast, the CIB contains input from other agencies and

is prepared for senior policy and security officials throughout the government, including senior levels of the military. The CIB does not include any raw intelligence or direct source information. Rather, the CIB includes only general intelligence and therefore, unlike the PDB, is not necessarily directed to the issues upon which the President and his most senior advisors currently are focused.
