
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(8) RWANDA IWG: On 12 May, PK/PE, SO/LIC, and MEA attended the State-hosted IWG on Rwanda. Joint Staff also attended and was basically the focus of attention. State was trying to fine tune the problem in Rwanda to come up with a mission statement that Joint Staff could use to begin its formal planning process. Apparently Joint Staff was tasked overnight by Dick Clark to begin formal mission planning for "something." The results of this meeting are somewhat foggy in the mind of the attendees--it will either be a large fixed force in Kıgali, or a large force that moves inward from the neighboring border areas "securing" the territory along corridors as it advances. We think that everyone there understands the importance of properly equipping and manning the forces for these missions. However, we were unable to get anyone to say they would use the word Chapter VII in the message. DAS Pru Bushnell said that deciding which Chapter it was going to use was up to the UN. We said that we were not opposed in principle to either a Chapter VI or a Chapter VII, we just wanted all parties concerned to understand what they were agreeing to. AF/C will either put their interpretation of today's meeting into a message that will be chopped at the Deputy level then sent to U.S. UN as guidance, or into a paper which will be the subject of a Deputies' Committee Meeting (as yet unscheduled). Until further guidance for U.S. UN can be finalized, U.S. UN will continue to use the talking points used by the VP in S. Africa. (LtCol

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
